- **2.3 The 60-30-10 Rule**
 - Is your dominant color roughly 60% of your layout?
 - Is your secondary color around 30%?
 - Is your accent color (often a complementary or contrasting hue) used for about 10% (e.g., calls-to-action)?

- **3.1 Psychological Color Meaning**
 - Do your chosen colors align with the emotions you want to evoke? (e.g., blue for trust, yellow for optimism)
 - Have you researched the common psychological associations of your core colors?
- **3.2 Cultural Considerations**
 - Have you considered the cultural meanings of your colors for your target audience (especially if global)?

- Are there any colors that might have unintended negative associations in specific cultures?

 - Does your chosen palette accurately reflect your brand's personality and values?
 - Is your brand identity reinforced by your color choices?
- **3.4 Color Accessibility**
 - Have you checked the contrast ratios between text and background colors (e.g., using WCAG guidelines)?
 - Is your design readable for users with various visual impairments (e.g., color blindness)?
 - Have you used accessible tools (like contrast checkers) to verify your palette?
